Working Through Your Options

Recommended resource: <u>A Framework for Analyzing any U.S. Copyright Problem</u>

- 1. Is the work protected by copyright?
 - i. If yes, who holds the rights?
- 2. Is there a license that covers my use?
 - i. This could be a license the library agreed to
 - ii. It could be a license attached to the work (e.g., a Creative Commons license)
- 3. Is there an exception (user right) that covers my use (e.g., 107, 108, 109, 110)?
- 4. Can I obtain permission or a license from the rightsholder?

- Only work if you are completely honest!

What this tool can do for you:

- Help you better understand how to determine the "fairness" of a use under the U.S. Copyright Code.
- Collect, organize & archive the information you might need to support a fair use evaluation.
- Provide you with a time-stamped, PDF document for your records [example], which could prove valuable, should you ever be asked by a copyright holder to provide your fair use evaluation and the data you used to
- · Provide access to educational materials, external copyright resources, and contact information for copyright help at local & national levels.

What this tool cannot do for you:

- This tool does not provide legal advice. It records the information you provide it as well as your own judgment on the fairness of the use. See the tool [disclaimer] for more information.
- Only a court of law can definitively rule on whether a use is fair or unfair. This tool does not assume or predict a court outcome.
